### **Best ophthalmologists** in America

111 doctors in 10 areas are bonored



n this issue of Ophthalmology Times, we present the results of our poll of chairmen and directors of residency training programs in all of the ophthalmology residency programs in the United States to select the best ophthalmologists in America.

It is extremely important to stress that we do not mean to emphasize the concept "best." We all know that there are many, many excellent ophthalmologists who give the highest quality eye care to their patients. This list is by no means meant to imply that the physicians selected are significantly better than the rest or that patients should seek them out. Rather, this list was constructed to honor the outstanding achievements of about 100 outstanding American ophthalmologists.

### **Outstanding contributions**

Thus, perhaps we should not call this survey the Best Ophthalmologists in America, but rather Awards for Outstanding Contributions to Ophthal-mology.

This poll was conceived to honor a number of ophthalmologists prior to the 100th anniversary of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. There are always biases no matter how a survey is conducted. On the positive side, the chairmen and directors of residency programs are in a position to know who the top ophthalmologists are, and also to be more likely to have reviewed their work critically in various journals. These individuals are thus a good source for the survey.


Jack M. Dodick, MD, is chairman, department of ophthalmology, Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital. He has served as president of numer-

ous ophthalmic societies and on the editorial board of several ophthalmic publications. He is a past president of ASCRS and has lectured worldwide on cataract and implant surgery.



I. Howard Fine, MD, of Eugene, OR, has designed instruments and implants and has innovated many surgical procedures including cortical cleaving

hydrodissection, chip and flip and crack and flip phacoemulsification techniques, and the temporal self-sealing clear corneal incision. He has written many articles and chapters in textbooks and surgical atlases, and has lectured



and taught throughout the world.



James P. Gills, MD, is founder/director. St. Luke's Cataract & Laser Institute in Tarpon Springs, FL. He is a clinical professor of ophthalmology at University

of South Florida and has published more than 100 medical articles. He has also authored or co-authored seven medical reference textbooks. He is a member of the Wilmer Ophthalmological Institute Advisory Board, the American College of Eye Surgeons' Board of Directors, Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Honor Society (Duke Chapter). He delivered the 1996 Innovator's Lecture at ASCRS and was the 1990 Entrepreneur of the Year, State of Florida. Other awards: the 1995 Tampa Bay Ethics Award, 1990 Athlete of the Year, Athletes International Ministries; 1991 Tom Landry Award, Fellowship of Christian Athletes.



As medical director of the Gimbel Eye Centres, Howard V. Gimbel, MD, has been actively involved in surgery, research, and education in cataract and

refractive surgery. He has a special interest in prevention of eye disease through lifestyle choices. He is clinical assistant professor at the University of Calgary, associate clinical professor at Loma Linda University, and clinical professor at the University of California, San Francisco. For 11 years he chaired the international Canadian Rockies Symposium on Cataract and Refractive Surgery in Kananaskis and Banff, Alberta.



John D. Hunkeler, MD, FACS, serves as chairman of the board of Hunkeler Eye Centers and chairman of the University of Kansas Medical Center's

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department of ophthalmology. He is a past president of ASCRS (1993-1995). Dr. Hunkeler has been in private practice in Kansas City, MO, since 1973 specializing in cataract, cornea, and refractive surgery.



Charles D. Kelman, MD, pioneered cryo-extraction and cryo-retinopexy, invented phacoemulsification, designed successful anterior chamber

and posterior chamber IOLs, and designed the first silicone IOL. Dr.Kelman won the American Academy of Ophthalmology Achievement Award, First Outstanding Achievement Award for Excellence in Cataract Surgery (CSO), First Innovators Award (ASCRS), Binkhorst Medal (ASCRS), Ridley Medal (ICO), Inventor of the Year Award, and National Medal of Technology, which was

awarded by President Bush. He has written several dozen articles and book chapters and an autobiography entitled *Through My Eyes*. He was the 1995 president of ASCRS.



Paul S. Koch, MD, of Warwick, RI, has helped a generation of eye surgeons convert to phacoemulsification. His deceptively simple books on

this subject have become standard among residency programs. Dr. Koch is devoted to simplifying phacoemulsification and making it accessible for all eye surgeons. He is especially proud of his work developing Stop and Chop phacoemulsification, structurally analyzing incisions, and defining strategies for working through small pupils. He helped popularize bimanual vitrectomy techniques and intraocular anesthesia. He has also helped RK surgeons improve accuracy by developing the personalized K-Constant.



Manus C. Kraff, MD, is a professor of clinical ophthalmology at Northwestern University. He is the past president and current program

chairman of ASCRS; an Executive Committee member of AAO's Refractive Surgery Interest Group; and a past trustee of the AAO board of trustees.



Richard J. Mackool, MD, is the founder of The Mackool Eye Institute, which opened in 1983 as the first eyecare center in New York

to provide cataract removal without the need for hospitalization. An inventor of numerous instruments for cataract removal including phacoemulsification, he has published more than 100 scientific papers, textbooks, and textbook

chapters, and has been granted 12 U.S. patents as well as patents in 15 foreign countries. He has lectured throughout the United States and abroad and conducts courses in ophthalmic microsurgery that are attended by eye surgeons from around the world.



Stephen A. Obstbaum, MD, was a National Eye Institute Fellow in glaucoma in St. Louis, MO. He is professor of clinical ophthalmology at New York

University Medical Center and director of the department of ophthalmology at Lenox Hill Hospital in New York. Dr. Obstbaum is a past president of ASCRS, the president of the IIIC, and is senior secretary for advocacy and a member of the AAO board of trustees. He is president-elect of the AAO. He is editor of the Journal of Cataract and Refractive Surgery and serves on the editorial boards of several ophthalmic publications.



Randall J. Olson, MD, is professor and chair of ophthalmology at the University of Utah. As founding director of the John A. Moran Eye Center, he is a

corneal specialist with an interest in the complications of cataract surgery. His residency was completed at UCLA with fellowships at the University of Florida and LSU Eye Center.



Robert H. Osher, MD, is medical director of the Cincinnati Eye Institute. He completed his residency at the Bascom Palmer Eye Institute and fellowships in Miami

and at Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia. He has served as the editor of the *Video Journal of Cataract & Refractive Surgery* since its inception in 1983. Dr. Osher has designed IOLs and instruments for cataract surgery, and he remains active as an author

and videographer. He has delivered more than 150 invited lectures in more than 25 countries



Robert M. Sinskey, MD, did his residency at Duke and was an Atomic Energy Commission fellow. He was Lt. Jg. U.S. Navy with Atomic Bomb Casualty Commission,

Hiroshima, 1951-153. He is medical director at Southern California Lions Institute and a clinical professor of ophthalmology at Jules Stein Eye Institute and on the advisory board, Duke Eye Center. He won ASCRS' Innovation Award and has been a guest faculty and surgeon in more than 85 symposiums around the world.



Walter J. Stark, MD, is professor of ophthalmology and director of the corneal service, The Wilmer Institute, The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He is a

consultant and former chairman of the FDA's Ophthalmic Devices Panel; medical director of the Medical Eye Bank of Maryland; member of board of directors of Tissue Banks International; Honor Award Recipient (1980), Senior Honor Award Recipient (1991), AAO; and consultant to the National Eye Institute of the NIH and the National Naval Medical Center. Major areas of study are in IOLs, corneal transplant immunology, and the

use of lasers in ophthalmology.



An international consultant in cataract, refractive, and corneal surgery, Roger F. Steinert, MD, is the principal author of Cataract Surgery and has

authored two other textbooks, more than 30 book chapters, and over 80 publications in the peer-review literature. He is a summa cum laude graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Medical School, and completed his residency at Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary. Dr. Steinert is assistant clinical professor at Harvard Medical School and in practice at Ophthalmic Consultants of Boston.
